	 a. First, in the Greek translation of the Hebrew Scriptures, the Septuagint, "Lord" is the most common term for God, appearing more than nearly 8000X. Of those references, more than are for the divine name YHWH. It is never used for pagan deities or idols. Therefore, to ascribe this same title to Jesus is a direct statement of His deity. b. As Lord, Jesus is the One who is now this rebellious creation. 	c. We emulate His example – others. "When he had finished washing their feet, he put on his clothes and returned to his place. 'Do you understand what I have done for you?' he asked them. 'You call me 'Teacher' and 'Lord,' and rightly so, for that is what I am. Now that I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also should wash one another's feet. I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you.
